
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The oldest Scouts enjoyed a camp last weekend, with many thanks to Baldock Trefoil Guild whose donation bought us a much needed patrol tent. We organised the Scouts into teams and they spent the weekend on a challenge hike around the city deciphering clues to visit different plazas, statues, and points of historical interest. Now we are busy fund-raising as they are hoping to participate in a regional camp next month which should be an excellent opportunity for our kids to join in with Scouts from other groups, and to grow in confidence when they realise that they have at least as much to offer as anyone else.

People have asked us about inflation in Argentina. Argentina's inflation rate is presently estimated at 71%, up from 64% in June, and some forecasters are predicting close to 100% by the end of the year. Inflation has historically been an ongoing issue in Argentina; *"Inflation Rate in Argentina averaged 191.17 percent from 1944 until 2022, reaching an all time high of 20262.80 percent in March of 1990 and a record low of -7 percent in February of 1954"* (focus-economics.com). Currently Argentina is in 5th place in the world, only outranked by Venezuela, Sudan, Lebanon and Syria. Wages are a long way behind, creating a widening chasm between what people earn and what they need, which in turn causes civil and political unrest. However, we also observe that people are surprisingly philosophical; the average Argentinean seems less panicked about the prospect of 100% inflation than their northern hemisphere counterparts are about their countries hitting 10%. Possibly born from experience of living through regular economic crises, people become resourceful and find ways of getting through, as per this article on the resurgence of bartering; https://abcnews.go.com/International/wireStory/bartering-increases-argentina-inflation-soaring-88258645
